NAOMI RAGEN (Playwright) Over the past fifteen years, author and playwright Naomi Ragen has quietly become one of the Jewish world's most controversial and most read novelists and political commentators. An American born in New York, Naomi Ragen has lived and worked in Jerusalem for the past 38 years and is the author of seven international bestsellers, the award winning play *Women's Minyan* and an influential and widely-read internet website. An iconoclast, an Orthodox woman and a fiercely outspoken advocate for gender equality, her novels hold a unique place in the Jewish library. Her first book, *Jephte's Daughter*, was listed among the one-hundred most important Jewish books of all time. Israelis voted her the third most popular author in Israel and her books have become a cultural bridge between Israelis and their Diaspora counterparts.

Director's Notes

Domestic Violence is present in every society, every day, in every part of the world. By design the abuse often occurs behind closed doors, shrouding the events in secrecy and silencing its victims in shame. Because of the nature of this violence, it is always difficult to talk about. How can we come together as a community to make it easier?

Who are Haredi/Ultra Orthodox Jews? These are terms often used to describe Jews who subscribe to the most theologically conservative form of Judaism, although Jews described by either term object to them. They simply refer to themselves as Jews, or Torah Observant Jews. These Jews believe God wrote the Torah, strictly observe Jewish Law (halacha), and refuse to modify Judaism to meet contemporary needs. Some live in tightly insular communities. In Israel around 50 percent of this population lives below the poverty line. It is important to note that within this denomination of Judaism – there is extraordinary diversity of traditions, beliefs and interpretations.

Naomi Ragen is a Modern Orthodox Religious Zionist who has championed the rights of "haredi/ultra-orthodox" women in her fiction, blogs & journalism. Can outsiders be a legitimate voice for the women in this community?

This play ran for 6 years and over 450 performances in Israel to mainstream secular and modern orthodox audiences. What might it reflect about interreligious and religious/ secular tensions in Israel?
