SHMUEL VILOZHNY (Playwright) born 1954, is a director, film & theatre actor, comedian & politician. A pioneer of the standup comedian scene, he started the Camel Comedy Club, developing other comedians. A beloved & entertaining performer, he has performed everywhere in the country & appeared in many movies, including one of his own based on his journey with his survivor father back to Europe. Political aspirations have led him to play a role in city government & he has been on the green party list for Knesset elections. A soldier during the Yom Kippur war, he served in a Performing Troop that toured throughout the country. Through a close friend & former Yom Kippur War POW, Vilozhny was drawn to the experience of these men & introduced to Arieh Segev's work.

ARIEH SEGEV (Author, *I Didn't Execute the Mission*) was a corporal serving reserve duty from September along the Suez Canal when the Yom Kippur War broke out. He published his book in 2001.

DAVID BOUSSI (**Guest**) Born 1947 in Kfar Saba to parents who had arrived from Yemen in '42, David Boussi was an enlisted soldier in the 6-day War & a reservist in the Yom Kippur War. A member of a scouting unit of the Golani Brigade, he served initially along the Jordanian border before being sent to the Egyptian border where he crossed the Suez, joining the Israeli forces that pushed towards Cairo, ultimately forcing a truce with Egypt.

JTC Notes

In a coordinated and surprise attack on Yom Kippur, 1973, approximately 180 Israeli tanks faced an onslaught of 1,400 Syrian tanks. Along the Suez Canal, fewer than 500 Israeli defenders were attacked by 80,000 Egyptians. The war destroyed the myth of Israel's invincibility and eroded the nation's self confidence.

The **BarLev line** stretched along the 110 miles of the Suez Canal. The tremendously fortified network of 26 fortresses proved a success during the War of Attrition but by 1973, 10 of the 26 fortresses had been closed and on the eve of Yom Kippur those remaining were manned by just 436 reservists. The fortresses were quickly cut off by invading Egyptian forces and the Israeli defenders paid a high price with a casualty rate of almost 50 percent.

This play takes you into the debriefing room of a returned POW from the Suez front as Officer and Soldier wrestle with the implications of the war.

Questions for thought:

- How has the Israeli Defense Forces (IDF) changed since the establishment of the State?
- What is the responsibility of the soldier to the state and the state to the soldier?
- What challenge do POWs represent to Israel?
- What is the significance of Asher being from Morocco?
- *High Noon* was adapted from an autobiographical novel released in 2001. How does that timing impact Israeli perspective on the play?

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
